# Minutes of the Meeting held at Barking Village Hall Annexe at 7.00pm on Thursday 21st March 2019

## **Bpc172/18 Apologies for Absence**

County Cllr K Oakes - apologies accepted. Cllr A Smith arrived at 7.30pm

## Bpc173/18 Declaration of Interest and Requests for dispensation

No declaration of interests declared or requests for dispensation had been received.

Bpc174/18 County Clir Kay Oakes Suffolk County Council 2019/20 budget approved On 14 February, Suffolk County Council concluded its budget setting process for this coming financial year (2019/2020). From 1 April 2019 to 31 March 2020, Suffolk County Council will spend almost £10 million a week across all its services following approval of this budget of £519.3 million. Over the period 2011-12 to 2018-19 the Council has made over £260 million of savings in response to reductions in funding from Central Government and increasing demand for services. For 2019/20 the Council has proposed a range of savings totalling around £13 million. These savings are required to help balance the budget - something that the Council must do by law. Recognising the unrelenting rise in demand and the complexity of support required by vulnerable children and adults in Suffolk, the Council are significantly increasing spending in these two top priority areas. The net budget for Adult and Community Services (ACS) will rise to £243m and the net budget for Health, Wellbeing and Children's Services (HWCS) will rise to £147m. This is an increase of just over £14 million for ACS and HWCS. ACS and HWCS will account for 75% of the total spend in 2019/2020 - three in every four pounds the Council spends. General council tax will rise by 2.99% this year. The Council are also applying the final 1% of the six per cent Social Care precept allowed over the years 2017/18 to 2019/20. The overall increase in council tax is one per cent less than for 2018/19. The four-year investment in surface-dressing our roads continues into its third year and the Council will treat 1,000 miles of Suffolk's roads by the end of 2020 as promised. The Council has also maintained Suffolk Fire and Rescue's budget and protected Suffolk's Library services. The Council is looking to maximise the financial contribution from its medium-term programmes, which focus on transforming how the Council delivers its services and works with other authorities and public sector partners. The Council's transformation programmes have saved over £12 million in 2018/19 and £12-£13 million of savings are planned for 2019/20. Funding agreed for Citizens Advice in Suffolk On 11 February, it was reported that Citizens Advice in Suffolk will no longer see any difference in their funding for 2019/20. This is due to a collaboration between Suffolk County Council, NHS Ipswich and East Suffolk Clinical Commissioning Group and NHS West Suffolk Clinical Commissioning Group, Suffolk County Council proposes to reduce the funding given to Citizens Advice by 50% (£187k), in 2019/20. Under the joint agreement now in place with the CCGs, a total of £187k will be provided by NHS Ipswich and East Suffolk and NHS West Suffolk CCGs. So, funding for Citizens Advice in 2019/20 will remain the same as the previous year (£374k Important Information: Suffolk School Travel Changes from September 2019 Suffolk County Council (SCC) is implementing changes to its School Travel Policy from September 2019. The Council has already written to all schools and Town and Parish Councils with information about the policy changes and how they may affect families in their area

# **Bpc175/18 District Cllr Anne Killett**

**Latest situation on 5 year housing land supply** District councillors at the full council meeting on Monday 18<sup>th</sup> March were told that the results of the consultation on the MSDC Housing Land Position Statement 2018/2019 were that the housing land supply can be evidenced to be 5.06 years. The review of the housing land supply position was triggered by the decision on a planning appeal concerning a development in Woolpit last August. If the 5 year housing land supply can be defended, then more weight can be given to local plans and policies in making planning decisions. **Neighbourhood Plans** Stradbroke Neighbourhood Development Plan and Debenham Neighbourhood Development Plan were both adopted

at the full council meeting on 18<sup>th</sup> March. With these in place and a 5 year housing land supply, the aspirations of these parishes for where and how development should take place in their communities should have more influence in the planning system. The District Council has committed £120,000 to support communities in the development of neighbourhood plans. It is a structured and time-consuming process but does bring influence. Communities can work together on Neighbourhood Plans. **Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Expenditure Framework** CIL monies that are collected from developers must be spent on infrastructure. MSDC has a published list (known as the Regulation 123 list) that defines infrastructure that can have CIL funds spent on it. A Framework setting out how money could be bid for from the fund was approved last year and has just been reviewed after the first year. The review involved MSDC councillors, SCC councillors and the MSDC Overview and Scrutiny Committee. There will now be more notice to Parishes, with emails being sent out three months before each Bid round opens. There have been two rounds of bids so far, with £156,979 of £425,699 spent in round 1 and £78,938 of £712,151 in round 2. £633,194 will be carried forward to Bid Round 3.

# Bpc176/18 Public Forum

A member of the public asked if there was room for negotiation over the easement to the land north of the Tye for 9 dwellings. The Chairman said the parish Council uphold their objection.

## **Bpc177/18 Correspondence**

The Councillors signed the Deed of Grant of Easement for Cameron Croft; It was agreed for the hedge to be replanted at Tye Farm as it is within the owners curtilage; Clerk to request more details about the design of the windmill to be sited outside the village hall, possible vandalism and to ask about the grass verge being cut while the windmill is in place; following the discussion in the above item it was agreed for the Parish Council to from a sub-committee for the proposed footpath for the village.

## **Bpc178/18 Footway near Nursing Home Corner**

Clerk to report to Highways that the vegetation has grown a long way over the path so it is now very narrow. Also Clerk to report the footpath from there to Needham Market has become very narrow as the earth from the bank has covered most of the path and difficult to use now.

#### **Bpc179/18 Grass Cutting Contract**

It was agreed to accept the revised quote from Vertas for £3,943.54 + vat by reducing the number of cuts to 14 for 2019/20

To help reduce the damage from strimming to the play equipment Cllr smith has fitted metal collars around the base of the some of the play equipment posts and wants to check their suitability before continuing – Clerk to liaise.

After considering the quotes to replace the mats below the adult swings and considering the effect the work would have on the Tye it was agreed to buy bark chips to put underneath the swings. Clerk to obtain quotes.

#### Bpc180/18 Village Beacon

It was agreed to make another sleeve so the beacon can be moved closer to the war memorial when it is to be used. Clerk to ask the Forge for a quote for the work.
